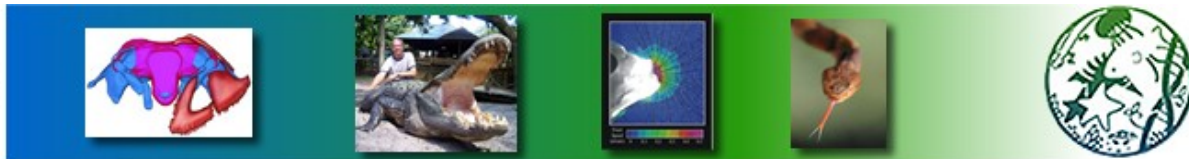
Greetings one and all,

I have just returned from our Program Committee meeting in Salt Lake City. The Salt Palace Convention Center where most of our program will take place is quite impressive and conveniently located across the street from our meeting hotel. Given the great abstracts that we scheduled it should be a wonderful meeting. As many of you know the SICB Executive Committee voted to extend the meeting to a full 4 days. Thus, the meeting starts on Monday afternoon, Jan. 3 and ends on Friday afternoon, Jan. 7 at **5:30 pm**. Indeed there will be many contributed talks (and 3 symposia) on the last day of the meeting.

We have 11 exciting symposia and 1099 contributed posters and talks planned for the upcoming meeting. Our division had a total of 30 oral presentations and 35 posters. Those presenting posters should be happy to learn that given the very large room available for our poster sessions we have planned for much more space between poster boards, which should significantly improve traffic during poster sessions.

We are co-sponsoring two symposia that our membership should be especially interested in:

- Tuesday, January 4, 2011: *Society-wide Symposium: **Speciation in Marine Organisms***, organized by M.P. Miglietta, F. Santini and A. Faucci.
- Thursday, January 6, 2011: **Environmentally-Cued Hatching Across Taxa: Embryos Choose A Birthday**, organized by K. Martin.

It should be noted that in the initial sorting I had a total of only 28 abstracts. It is VERY im-

portant that if you want your talk to be included with everyone else in DEDB the first topic that you choose needs to be Evolutionary Developmental Biology. The first, and often final, sorting of abstracts is based on the first topic that you pick. Many of the orphaned talks are ones in which the first topic was not well chosen. I can assure you that we agonize over where best to put these abstracts but having the presenter put them in the right category is the most important factor.

JUDGES NEEDED. We have several students competing for Best Student Paper. We need volunteers to judge posters and oral presentations. Please contact the Chair (M.Q. Martinale) if you wish to help out!

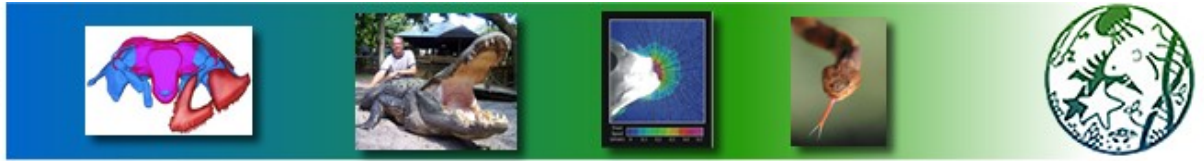
