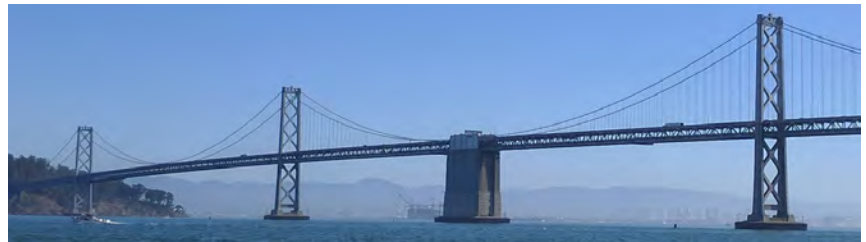

The process to name the BSP awards started more than 2 years ago and is due to the efforts of current and previous officers including Diana Hews,

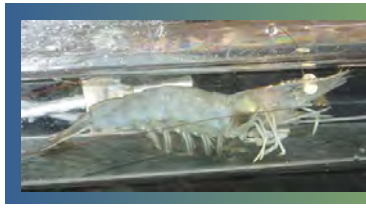

SICB continues to grow, and the annual meeting in San Francisco will be another record-breaker with a total of over 1,940 total abstract submissions. Animal Behavior will continue to be a key part of SICB with over 160 behavior-related oral presentations, and 140 behavior-related posters at the upcoming meeting. We received 20 applications for the newly-named Marlene Zuk Award for the best student oral presentation, and six of these were selected to present in our special competition session. Make sure to mark your schedules for this exciting session, on Thursday, January 4! As well, we received 26 applications for the Elizabeth Adkins-Regan Best Student Poster award.

Symposia continue to be the heart of the SICB annual meeting, and the Division of Animal Behavior is co-sponsoring five symposia in San Francisco: "Science Through Narrative: Engaging Broad Audiences", "Sensory Feedback and Animal Locomotion: Perspectives from Biology and Biorobotics", "Understanding the Evolution of Endocrine System Variation through Large-scale Comparative Analyses", "Science in the Public Eye: Leveraging Partnerships", and "Behavioral and Physiological Adaptation to Urban Environments".

It is never too soon to start thinking about symposium proposals for the 2020 meeting in Austin. The proposals will be due next

summer. If you have any questions about organizing a symposium send me an email or flag me down. The work is not too onerous, but it does require some planning and organization. We would like the breadth of animal behavior research to be continued to be reflected in the symposia and resultant publications in the society's journal, *Integrative and Comparative Biology*.

It will be great to return to San Francisco, with a full meeting program and lots to see in the area, and great places to eat. Our last visit to San Francisco was 2013 and we are excited to be returning there so soon.

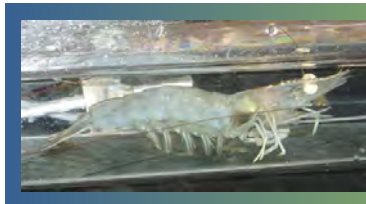
Planning for the 2018 SICB meeting in San Francisco

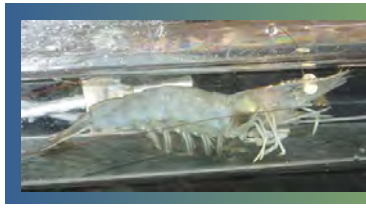

The deadline for all of these applications was October 20, so if you missed these opportunities this year, make sure to look out for them as you prepare for SICB 2019.

- **Broadening participation travel award:** Funds to attend the 2018 SICB Meeting
- **Charlotte Magnum Student Support Program:** Funds to attend the 2018 SICB Meeting
- **Dorothy M. Skinner Award:** Funds to attend the 2018 SICB Meeting for female scientists (typically awarded to postdocs)
- **GIAR/FGST:** Funds to support student research (Grants in Aid of Research, and Fellowship of Graduate Student Travel awards)
- **Libbie Hyman Memorial Scholarship:** Funds to support student research on invertebrates (due Feb. 5, 2018)

DAB Research Highlights

Kirsty MacLeod, Postdoctoral Researcher, Pennsylvania State University

My research focuses on how mothers influence the traits and life histories of their offspring through flexible investment or maternal effects, and what the evolutionary consequences of these effects might be. Currently I am investigating how gestational stress in response to invasive fire ants influences the traits and survival of offspring in the eastern fence lizard (*Sceloporus undulatus*), and particularly whether this stress allows them to better deal with the same stressor in their own lifetime. Other recent work shows that the stress of predation risk alone can significantly influence maternal survival in snowshoe hares, as well as the survival of their young, even though they were never themselves exposed to predators. Together, this work suggests multi-generational effects of encounters with predators large and small, that may have long-lasting impacts on prey population dynamics. This reflects my interest in incorporating physiology, behavior, and ecology to help us understand both proximate mechanisms and evolutionary outcomes of maternal effects in wild animal systems.

Danielle Lee, Assistant Professor, Southern Illinois University, Edwardsville

The DN Lee Lab is an intersectional research squad built on the principles of Service Scholarship. We conduct basic science in service of applied research interests that benefit public health, ecosystem services, and future innovation. We operate within urban communities, engaging members in inquiry and basic research. Our research includes field studies and experimental behavioral observations of field mice and rats. This work includes trapping, marking, and releasing mammals to identify their nest locations, home ranges, studying community interactions with other plants and animals, and behavioral observations in novel test mazes and activities. I am currently recruiting students interested in pursuing Masters research examining nuisance mice behavior and ecological interactions in urban and suburban contexts.
