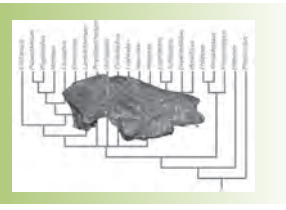
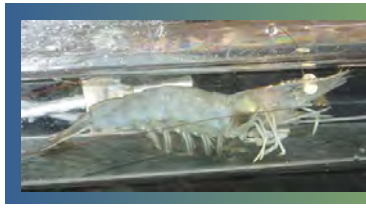

Message from the Program Officer

I am writing to report back on the Program Officers' meeting and to highlight a few events at the 2018 SICB meeting that are relevant to the DEDB community. The Program Officers met in San Francisco on the weekend of October 7 to organize the schedule for the 2018 meeting. We had a very busy but productive meeting.

Abstracts, symposia and workshop for the 2018 meeting

This year, we had 1940 abstract submissions, which were organized into 142 oral sessions and 66 poster sessions. As you can imagine, this is a challenging endeavor that requires much coordination between various divisions! DEDB received 42 oral and 28 poster abstracts, which I, in collaboration with the DIZ officers, organized into six oral sessions and three poster sessions, respectively. I apologize in advance if the abstracts are not placed in ideal sessions and/or there are potential conflicts with other concurrent sessions.

This year, eight out of 14 oral abstracts submitted for the Best Student Presentation competition were selected by a committee assembled by Julia Bowsher, our Divisional Secretary. These were organized into one DEDB BSP session (Friday, January 5, 1:30-3:30 PM), and the talks will be evaluated by a panel of DEDB judges. Thank you for submitting all your abstracts, and congratulations to those of you who were selected to compete! I look forward to hearing your talks.

In addition, DEDB is sponsoring four exciting symposia at the 2018 meeting:

1. "From Small and Squishy to Big and Armored: Genomic, Ecological and Paleontological Insights into the Early Evolution of Animals," a SICB-wide symposium organized by Erik Sperling & Kevin Kocot (January 4)
2. "Evolution in the Dark: Unifying Understanding of Eye Loss," organized by Megan Porter and Lauren Sumner-Rooney (January 4)
3. "Science Through Narrative: Engaging Broad Audiences," a SICB-wide symposium organized by Sara Elshafie, Stuart Sumida, and Bram Lutton (January 5)

4. "Integrative Biology of Sensory Hair Cells," organized by Duane McPherson and Billie Swalla (January 6).

Finally, Gunter Wagner (Yale University) is organizing a DEDB workshop on January 6, 6:30-9:30 PM. The workshop will focus on the mechanisms of cell type origination.

At the Program Officers' meeting, we also selected the 12 symposia for the 2019 SICB meeting. This year, we received 16 symposium proposals, which is big improvement over last year's 11. Thank you very much to those of you who contributed a proposal. You will be notified of the outcome soon.



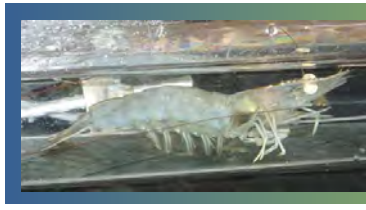
Organizing the Program for the annual meeting

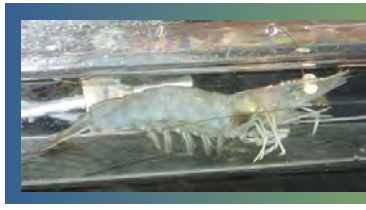
